


# King County Reengagement System Quarterly Report

Compiling quarterly data allows us to collectively track progress and identify resources the system needs to better serve young people. This data effort began January 2016 with collaboration from the King County Reengagement Provider Network. The goal is to understand regional capacity and student outcomes across programs as they reconnect our region’s disconnected young people to education and support their progress toward secondary and postsecondary credentials and career attainment. This data is a starting point for ongoing conversations around progress and action. In this report you’ll find overall outcomes across participating programs.




# OUTREACH HIGHLIGHTS

King County Reconnect to Opportunity (ReOpp) helps young people reengage in a best-fit education program or employment. During the 2017 Winter quarter, 29% of referred youth reengaged! As shown in the figures below, this quarter ReOpp worked with 414 youth and 122 of referred youth were formally enrolled in a King County reengagement program or employment.

To date, 40% of students referred to ReOpp have been reengaged! That is 372 young people of the 922 total referred.



For students to be billable under Open Doors they must meet a combination of requirements: meeting minimum monthly attendance; having weekly program contact; and making academic progress.

## QUARTERLY DEMOGRAPHICS

Most students served in participating King County programs are students-of-color and many are low-income. These overall student demographics vary little quarter-to-quarter. Below are demographics and barriers among students enrolled in the current quarter. Keep in mind that totals vary based on data completeness across programs.



## END OF QUARTER STATUS

The following measures present a snapshot of student success quarter-to-quarter and can help answer questions like: at the end of each quarter what proportion of students were still enrolled? How many earned a credential? And of all students served in a given quarter, how many transferred to another education program and how many exited without a credential? The Quarterly Stick Rate, at the bottom of this section, shows the percentage of youth in this quarter that persisted across the quarter or exited with a credential.

### QUARTERLY STICK RATE

In 2017 Winter there were 1,192 students with a positive status (groups in green). To calculate the Stick Rate, divide 1,192 by the total students served 1,374, excluding students who transferred and students who earned credential before the 2017 Winter quarter (groups in grey).  $1,192 / 1,374 = 87\%$





## QUARTERLY CREDENTIALS EARNED

As of the publication of this quarterly report, 618 students have earned a credential! Each quarter our region has between 100-200 students who have earned a credential –mostly GEDs and diplomas. These students, however, only make up 5-14% of all students enrolled.




Among students who earned a credential in 2017 Winter, most earned a G.E.D.

## CREDENTIAL EARNING BY RACE

Credential earning rates by race/ethnicity is one way to track how our region is serving youth and the extent to which we are closing gaps. For instance, Hispanic/Latino students are the 2nd largest racial demographic served by our region's programs, yet students often have the lowest rates of credential earning. Below, we see of the 386 total Hispanic/ Latino students enrolled in all King County Programs in the 2017 Winter quarter, only 2% earned a credential. That is only 8 Hispanic/ Latino students. Also, while the 386 Hispanic/ Latino students are a large population of youth served, students are a small portion of the population of credential earners. The extent to which a racial group is over or underrepresented in credential earning is shown in the last column, below.



## POSTSECONDARY HIGHLIGHTS


Seattle Education Access (SEA) partners with many Open Doors programs in King County to provide college and career planning and transition support to youth as they near completion of their secondary credential. The data below captures work they have been doing July 1, 2015 - March 31, 2017 with Open Doors partners in the Road Map Project region and with support from a federal Social Innovation Fund grant. Below are the demographics for the 228 students enrolled under this grant.

Of note, over half of SEA students are First Generation HS Graduates. During this period, of the 188 SEA High School Graduates 45% (or 85 students) were the first in their family to have graduated high school!





Of the 228 Open Doors students receiving navigation support from SEA under this grant, 97 have since enrolled in a postsecondary pathway.



### Outcomes of the 97 Students Enrolled in Postsecondary



### 76% Postsecondary Persistence

Of the 37 students who enrolled in postsecondary in 2015, 76% (or 28 students) have since enrolled in a second year of college!
